

A New House of God

On September 8, 2020, the Most Rev. David Kamau, auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of Nairobi, blessed the new Our Lady of Visitation Monastery of the Missionaries of the Poor in Kenya. It was to mark the completion of many years of labor in establishing the new monastery.

In 2007, Fr. Brian Kerr, M.O.P., a founding member of M.O.P., and two other Kenyan Brothers; Br. Vincent Mutiso, M.O.P., and Br. Cyrus Musyoka, M.O.P., was sent to open a mission in Kenya. Their arrival was met with delight by the then local Archbishop Most Rev. Ndingi Mwana Wa Nzeki in the Archdiocese of Nairobi. With the help of the Archbishop, they found a suitable place to start a mission in Ruai Chokaa, a slum area, where people live in utter poverty. They first rented a house, and within a year, they were able to purchase a land. Then, they started the construction of the Mabhati home for the ministry.

By then, the Brothers had already started a daycare center in the area. They have 60 children under their care who came from impoverished families. They provided free breakfast and lunch. They catechized and taught them how to pray. On Sundays, all these children gathered for the Holy Mass, and many of them received the sacrament of

baptism. Right now, there are over 200 children sponsored by the M.O.P. Brothers. Parents of these children, who were live-in partners, have received the sacrament of matrimony through the help of the Brothers.

In 2012, the Brothers opened a home for the disabled and abandoned children. They had first admitted 12 disabled children in the facility, and as time went by, the number increases. 1n 2016, these children were shifted to the new facility. Now, there are 40 children in

the facility. After then, the construction of the monastery building started, and four years later, the establishment of the new monastery building was completed.

Br. Fidel, who is the local superior of this mission, says, "It's a great joy for all the Brothers here in Kenya Mission to have come to this beautiful day when we can see the completion of this house of God. It has taken great energy, sacrifices, and prayers for us to come this far. It is through the help of our friends and benefactors who supported us financially so that we can have this new monastery. Thus, to our friends, your sacrifices and prayers are not in vain. Now the Brothers have a place where they can pray and rest".

"Finally, as we rejoice at the opening of our new monastery, let us also open our hearts, let it be the dwelling place of our Lord Jesus Christ. May this new monastery from today onwards be a place for people to find solace with God.

The goodness, the love, the trust, the mutual respect, and, at the heart of it, the love of God, the love of neighbor, bind us together in this beautiful effort: The building of God's Kingdom here on earth, especially among the poor and forgotten abandoned people.

The Coronavirus has been a testing ground for the Missionaries of the Poor this year. Everyone has been affected by this virus directly or indirectly. So many of our friends and benefactors have told us of cases in their families and friends. But of the thousands that we know, no one has reported any deaths due to the virus. God has been great and wonderful. There have been infections but no fatalities.

Jamaica has been the most challenged: there are seventy-four of our residences, mostly at Faith Center, who were infected. Among our Brothers, fourteen initially were positive at Jesus Redeemer. Some forty-five of our worker-volunteers were held back from worked, for fear of the virus.

It was on the news on local television, and there were constant



callers and support, including the Ministry of Health. The Brothers did a tremendous job covering for workers and the Brothers who were short in numbers. Brothers were willing to live at Faith Center and work day and night to provide attention for the residences, who were quarantined.

Now there is a sigh of relief; almost miraculously, none of our homeless or our Brothers who had originallytested positive were fatalities. None of our workers and volunteers suffered.

During this year we have been praying, especially for guidance and protection for all our peoples. In one way or another, all of us have been affected, family-wise, friends, churches, businesses, socially.

We must continue to be watchful. But God is great and wonderful. He wants us to trust in Him, to draw closer to Him, and to understand. There is a promise of everlasting life. And, we must be ready for when He comes; He has a marvelous gift that exceeds anything here on earth or anything we can imagine. We will be together with Him in His heavenly kingdom. In the meanwhile, let us be about our Father's business, serving the poorest of people, filled with the gift of hope.

In this season of Christmas we must be grateful. We must be thankful for all the good things of life He has given us. And if there are difficulties, we must also learn to give thanks.

Philippines Needs Your Help!

Still picking up from the aftermath of Typhoon Molave – known locally as "Quinta", news of yet another one filled the airwaves, this time a category 5, capable of destroying everything on its path. By the end of the day Typhoon Goni – known locally as "Rolly" has developed into a super typhoon, making it the world's strongest tropical cyclone of the year.

At 4:50am, Sunday, November 1, Super Typhoon Rolly (Goni) made its first landfall in Bato, Catanduanes with a lashing maximum sustained winds of 225km/h, uprooting trees, toppling utility posts, smashing through houses and buildings and flattening agricultural landscapes leaving farmers on their knees.

The Northern Region of the Philippines saw the worst when floodwaters rose so rapidly propelling residents to the roof of their houses and leaving them with only clothes on their backs and cry out for rescue.

By 5:00am, Monday, November 2, Super Typhoon Rolly exited the Philippine Area of Responsibility leaving a trail of massive destruction. Our Naga Mission Monastery did sustain some structural damage but



nothing compare to the neighboring community and beyond. Many of our Brothers' families too have sustained heavy damages to their houses and properties.

As we celebrate this most joyous time of the year, let us remember our suffering brothers and sisters in the Philippines, who only have tears in their eyes at this moment and in this joyous Christmas season, please help us put a smile on their faces.
